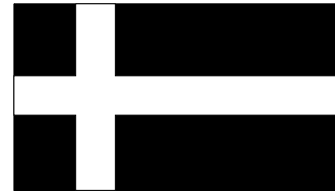
What's Happening on Campus . . .

Information Networking Management

The Information Networking Management (INM) program is one of the most highly sought after programs at UMC. It prepares students for positions in technology, networking, and other information management positions in industry, business and education. A Bachelor of Science graduate will have the knowledge, experience and skills to succeed in technology-related careers and the business and management competencies for mid-management positions such as information network specialists, network and intranet administrators, web masters, technology project managers, and information systems managers.

A graduate with a B.S. degree in INM will demonstrate abilities in computer information networking, database management, programming, accounting, and general management. They will be able to demonstrate skills in decision making through business networking and solving information systems problems. They will be able to use computer technology in preparing programs, presentations, written reports, and spreadsheets. They will also be able to demonstrate the ability to communicate clearly and concisely in written and oral communications through technical reports, solutions to information networking problems, and feasibility studies.

Students give presentations in class, and most utilize their lap-tops in the presentations.

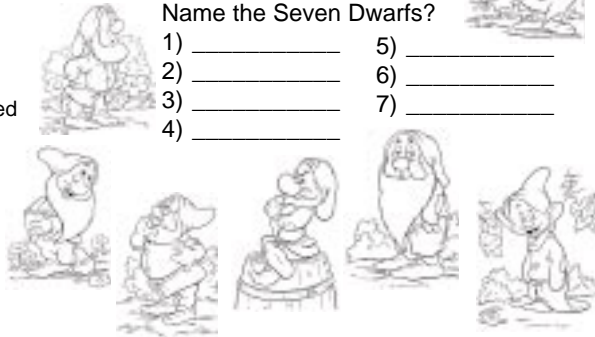

Recipe

There's nothing like warm cinnamon bread to get your taste buds going!

Cinnamon Bread

2 cups all-purpose flour
 1 cup white sugar
 2 tsp. baking powder
 1/2 tsp. baking soda
 1 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
 1 tsp. salt
 1 cup buttermilk

1/4 cup vegetable oil
 2 eggs
 2 tsp. vanilla extract
 2 tblsp. white sugar
 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
 2 tsp. margarine

Directions: Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease one 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Measure flour, 1 cup sugar, baking powder, soda, 1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon, salt, buttermilk, oil, eggs, and vanilla into large mixing bowl. Beat 3 minutes. Pour into greased pan. Smooth top. Sprinkle with topping. **Topping:** Combine 2 tblsp. white sugar, 1 tsp. cinnamon, and margarine, mixing until crumbly. Sprinkle topping over smoothed batter. Using knife, cut in a light swirling motion to give a marbled effect. Bake for about 50 minutes at 350 degrees. Test with toothpick. When inserted it should come out clean. Remove bread from pan to rack to cool.
